
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WELCOME

What is Noel Park Big Local?

Funded by the Big Lottery fund and administered by Local Trust, Big Local is an exciting opportunity for residents in 150 areas around England to use at least £1m each to make a massive and lasting positive difference to their communities.

Noel Park Big Local (NPBL) began in Noel Park in 2015, organised and run by a partnership made up of local residents, with guidance from a Big Local coordinator and a local trusted organisation.

Our goal is to make Noel Park a better place to live for all residents by planning and delivering resident-led initiatives that address large social issues while creating opportunities for local people.



Noel Park Big Local Area

The Noel Park Big Local area covers Noel Park Estate, Page High, The Sandlings and Sky City in Wood Green, Haringey, London.

BACKGROUND

Population of Noel Park

*"You can go around the world without leaving the neighbourhood"**

According to 2011 census data, the NPBL area has 6128 people living within its boundaries. Between 2001 and 2011, the area's population grew by 22%.

The NPBL area is rich in diversity, with residents representing over 23 different ethnic groups. Between 2001 and 2011, the white British population decreased to 24.5% and the black African population decreased to 8.7% but the white non-British population increased to 27.4%.

According to data available in 2015:

- 44% of children in St. Mark's Parish are living in poverty
- 23.7% of NPBL residents had no qualifications in 2011

Previous plan

The first NPBL plan focussed on delivering activities and initiatives responding to the key areas which remain our themes today and had successes in the areas of social enterprise, super seniors, green initiatives, job fairs, a jumble trail and community social events and fun days.

Some key areas that will carry through from the first plan to the second include:

- Environmental initiatives, including the Westbury Banks Nature Preserve, were successful and will continue.
- Enterprise and employment schemes, including the Wood Green Social Enterprise Forum and a job fair, were successful and will continue.

WHO WE ARE

*"There are good people in the neighbourhood. Sometimes they just have to be reminded that they're the good ones."**

The NPBL group is currently made up of 14 residents covering the areas of Noel Park estate, Page High and The Sandlings.

The group's make-up is diverse, reflecting much of the social, racial, and cultural makeup of the area. Three of the four areas which make up the NPBL area are represented.

We hope to expand the partnership in the coming months to include people from the Cypriot, traveler and Roma communities as well as private renters, residents from Sky City and some young representation (under 25) by setting up a parallel youth forum.

The NPBL group will always aim to ensure the projects and initiatives it runs faithfully represent and work for all people living within the NPBL area regardless of age, race, social mobility, sexual orientation, religion, disability, nationality, gender or marital status.



OUR VALUES

*"It's not just about the buildings or the neighbourhood. It's about the people in the buildings, but the people need the buildings to lay their heads."**

We endeavour to deliver all projects in a sustainable and inclusive way. NPBL is made up of four distinct areas, so projects need to work across all areas where appropriate. Throughout all our project planning and discussions, the following points will always be taken into consideration:

- Diversity and inclusion
- The cultural and linguistic diversity of the area
- The socio-economic diversity of the area
- Improved social integration
- Environmental sustainability
- Projects should have a long life and become financially sustainable so they can continue beyond the life of NPBL

The subsequent report outlines the themes, how we will be responding to each requirement, the expected spend and how the NPBL group intends to document and monitor each project's outcome.

OUR VISION

*"I would like to help if I knew how to get involved."**

The NPBL area is shaped by Wood Green high street, one of the busiest in the UK. While on the surface this seems like it could be a good source of jobs and activities, in reality, the jobs are generally zero-hours contract jobs in budget chains. Money made on the high road does not generally stay in the area. The high foot traffic brings crime and antisocial behaviour that take up valuable police and local authority resources.

This contributes to many of the negative things Wood Green, including the NPBL area, is known for:

- Littering and fly-tipping
- Lack of public and social activities and educational programmes
- Crime, knife crime, gang culture
- Poor social and health care in the area

In the first plan, we stated that our vision for the NPBL area was: "In 10 years' time, we would like Noel Park to be a great place to live, where everyone comes together and feels proud to belong here."

By carrying this sentiment through to the second plan and adding some additional projects and a refreshed approach, we believe that:

- Communities will be better able to identify local needs and take action in response to them.
- People will have increased skills and confidence so that they continue to identify and respond to needs in the future.
- People will feel that their area is an even better place to live.
- By having a cleaner and greener area, the well-being and mental health of people in the area will improve.
- Increased pride in the area will mean less littering and fly-tipping.

OUR LEGACY

*"The youth are our legacy. We need mentoring programmes with positive role models "**

At the end of our programme, we would like to leave the following legacy:

- A more confident and cohesive community with plenty of community-led projects, social enterprises and activities
- New skills, businesses and enterprises
- Increased training and employment opportunities
- Community hubs, including a new central hub
- Improvements and better use of green and open spaces
- A cleaner and more respected local environment
- Greater opportunities for children and young people

CONSULTATION

*"Can we have something where older people help younger people? We know a lot in our old age."**

We held a consultation for our second plan February, March and June 2018 with the aim of maximizing publicity to ensure that everyone in and around Noel Park knows about NPBL and its activities. The consultation was publicised with posters, social media and special events, stalls set up on seven occasions and leaflets that were hand delivered to every address in the NPBL area during February, March and June 2018.



NETWORKING

In preparation for this report, the NPBL group has also been networking and attending events to gain experience and connections with the local community and the wider Big Local community. Networking and events in the run-up to the submission of this plan include:

PREPARING THE PLAN

To prepare the plan, the NPBL partnership:

- Assessed the consultation submissions
- Submitted ideas for projects via a Google Doc submissions form
- Reviewed the submissions as a group to consolidate ideas and reduce duplication
- Categorised all of the projects under the themes and headers agreed by the group
- Identified cross-over between themes and headers
- Ensured all projects respond to consultation submissions and data regarding the local area
- Worked on an accompanying plan document (this document) to summarise the approach
- Met regularly during the plan creation stages

OUR NEW PLAN

After conducting a thorough consultation in 2018, and an evaluation of the successes and shortcomings of the first NPBL plan, the second NPBL plan aims to build on the successes of the first plan with open communication, continuation of the themes and a new approach to our projects. We aim to deliver most of the initiatives originally submitted in the first plan, along with some new initiatives and projects.

What is in our plan?

*"We have many skills in the neighbourhood. If we could get everyone together, that would be great."**

This is the second plan submission in the lifetime of NPBL, covering the remaining five years of the Big Local scheme. The NPBL group has evolved from a small core group of people representing several groups and organisations into a group of 14 partners with residents representing the areas of Noel Park, Page High and The Sandlings.

This plan aims to focus on five main themes:

- Community hubs and spaces
- Enterprise and employment
- Improving the environment
- Older and vulnerable people
- Young people

These themes have been carried over from the first plan, the headers have been suggested by the NPBL group and all projects have come from the consultation process and the group's own submissions.

By delivering the projects and initiatives outlined in this plan, NPBL aims to:

- Build on successes from the first plan
- Continue to support existing projects and groups
- Reinvigorate co-operation with groups that we worked with in the past
- Facilitate new opportunities for local people
- Provide community hubs, activities and educational opportunities
- Rekindle a feeling of pride in the area
- Create a cleaner, greener and more environmentally sustainable NPBL area

Community chest

In addition to projects falling under specific themes, the NPBL group will set aside and provide grants to smaller projects which have not been captured in this plan. We acknowledge that as the area evolves and changes, so will our needs. This fund is designed to help people from the community become involved in projects that benefit local people.

- A set amount will be reserved for Community Chest each year
- Grants from £250 to £5000 will be available from an annual fund of £20,000
- It will be for projects that cover a wide range of needs to improve the well-being of residents
- People living within the NPBL local area can apply for project funding via an application process
- Projects which fall within the NPBL themes will be prioritised
- Money can be used for buying materials, staffing, equipment, support groups, art clubs, etc.

Big Lunch

The Big Lunch was a local, community-led lunch for residents of the NPBL area. It was a huge success. Over 200 residents were served lunch with more visiting the booths and activities presented by local community organisations, such as Crutch Haringey, Bikes for Good Causes, Collage Arts and our local neighbourhood community police team.

Residents have requested more events like this to bring the community together.



Our themes

*"I grew up with the Swedish model of resilience learning. It could help everyone, but especially youth." **

The NPBL plan is a holistic one. Several projects fit into more than one theme and everything links together.

One of the key goals we wish to achieve with this plan is a closer community and pride in the area as a whole: several projects aim to deliver on these goals (e.g. provision of activities for older and young people, gardening clubs and measures to try and combat fly-tipping). We aim to address key issues in the NPBL area across the following themes and their sub-projects.

- Community hubs and spaces
- Enterprise and employment
- Improving the environment
- Older and vulnerable people
- Young people

The following projects work across multiple themes:

- By setting up a programme of clubs and classes, we will be utilising the community hubs as well as providing activities and resources for young people, older and vulnerable people
- By setting up planting schemes and gardening clubs, we aim to provide activities for older and young people as well as improving the environment
- By looking at heritage and conservation-related projects, we aim to improve the local environment, creating a greener and more attractive place to live which will enrich everyone's lives



Community hubs and spaces

*"My children have to attend clubs outside the area. We also deserve clubs and after school activities here in Wood Green."**

Consultation contributions

Lack of community space is a recurring theme in Noel Park. The need for community space was reflected during the NPBL consultation, with a great deal of support for community hubs and spaces related projects including:

- Youth clubs
- Addition of park fitness facilities
- Kitchen and a café in a community hub
- Children's play areas
- Vegetable patch
- Group litter picking

How NPBL will deliver

In response to this, NPBL aims to fulfil this requirement by:

- Creating new community hubs
- Supporting existing community hubs
- Setting up a programme of classes for local residents
- Holding a series of health-related pop-ups
- Facilitating markets in the local area
- Holding a local carnival
- Setting up play schemes for working parents
- Setting up plays and drama projects

Key goals

The key goals of this theme are to:

- Provide space for local activities
- Improve social integration
- Provide educational enrichment
- Reduce isolation
- Improve skills of local people
- Increase visibility of NPBL
- Support the local homeless and vulnerable people
- Support locally run workshops and clubs
- Better use the local spaces and buildings
- Increase pride in the local area
- Update signage and facilities

Community hubs and spaces (cont.)

Expected benefits/outcomes

By delivering on these goals, NPBL expects to see:

- Improved social integration
- Reduced unemployment
- A more confident and educationally enriched community
- Plenty of local activities for all ages and backgrounds
- Reduced youth crime
- A series of financially sustainable businesses and schemes

- Investigating recycling facilities for areas which do not currently have them
- Facilitating and setting up local groups to champion environmental projects
- Improving the park
- Planting trees and plants
- Continuing support for the Westbury Banks Nature Reserve

- Facilitating a soup kitchen and clothing bank for local homeless and vulnerable people
- Investigating links with existing groups, such as WI
- Continuing to support trips and excursions

- Provide a wide range of educational, physical and creative activities
- Combat isolation and loneliness
- Promote well-being and togetherness
- Counteract the lack of day centres and facilities in the area

Expected benefits/ outcomes

By delivering on these goals, the NPBL expects that there will be:

- Less isolation and more social integration
- Regular events and classes
- A vibrant community of older and vulnerable people who are happier and healthier than when we started this project
- A close working relationship with local groups and schemes

Consultation contributions

In the past year, Wood Green has been a focal point for youth violence. This was reflected in the responses of local people during the consultation. However, the young people we spoke to were quick to remind us that we should not only focus on the small number of youth involved in violent activities or in danger of being wayward, that we should also provide youth activities for aspirational youth to help them be the best that they can be. Overall, there was a great deal of support for projects relating to young people from people of all ages.

NPBL aims to fulfil some of the needs of youth in the area by:

- Setting up a programme of local classes and clubs
- Getting young people into sport and fitness
- Providing health pop-ups
- Improving the park
- Putting on trips and excursions
- Providing volunteering opportunities
- Setting up a youth employment schemeholder

We acknowledge that the coming years may see great social change in the area with a lot of unpredictability due to things like Brexit. The group will endeavour to assess needs and costs on an ongoing basis in order to reflect change and remain flexible.

The money earned in interest over the last five years will be utilised to cover cost rises due to inflation, social costs and as a contingency fund.

DELIVERY

How we will deliver the plan

We acknowledge that our plan, going forward, is not set in stone. We need to be able to react to changes in the local area, including any socio-economic changes that we may face in this unpredictable time.

MONITORING & EVALUATION

Measuring our impact

It's vital that we are able to measure the success of our projects and assess their ongoing validity. Did we achieve what we set out to do? Have we delivered all of the things that we planned on delivering? At what stage can we consider the project a success and close it?

Each of the proposed projects will include documentation methods and parameters including several from the following list:

- Delivery of some or all items in a project list
- set up of ongoing and independent activities, clubs and groups, living on beyond the NPBL plan
- Different outcome and more positive responses in a follow-up consultation
- Cleaner, greener area
- Less crime, more opportunities

Visits

In addition to input from the partnership, NPBL will be employing staff to run and coordinate many of the projects on its project list. In addition to that, regular visits and assessments will be made of the projects as they start up and on an ongoing basis.

The purpose of these visits is to raise the profile of NPBL, be visible to all participating in the projects as well as ensuring that everything remains on track and in line with the agreed plan.

Documentation: photos, articles, video

We will be documenting each of the projects we set up and instigate. This will be in the form of short write-ups, photos, articles via agreed communication channels and filming some of the projects where appropriate. Regular progress reports on each theme will keep us on track throughout each year and a central project list will ensure that we deliver everything we have agreed in the pre-planning phase.

Measuring our impact (cont)

Evaluation forms for our funded projects and spend reports

On completion, each project and theme will have a detailed evaluation process including evaluation forms for attendees outside of the NPBL group. This will allow us to measure and assess the real impact of our work by hearing it directly from the people we are working for.

As each project closes, a spend report will be produced to assess value for money and allow us to spot any operational changes that may be needed for subsequent projects. Funded projects will be visited and monitored closely.
